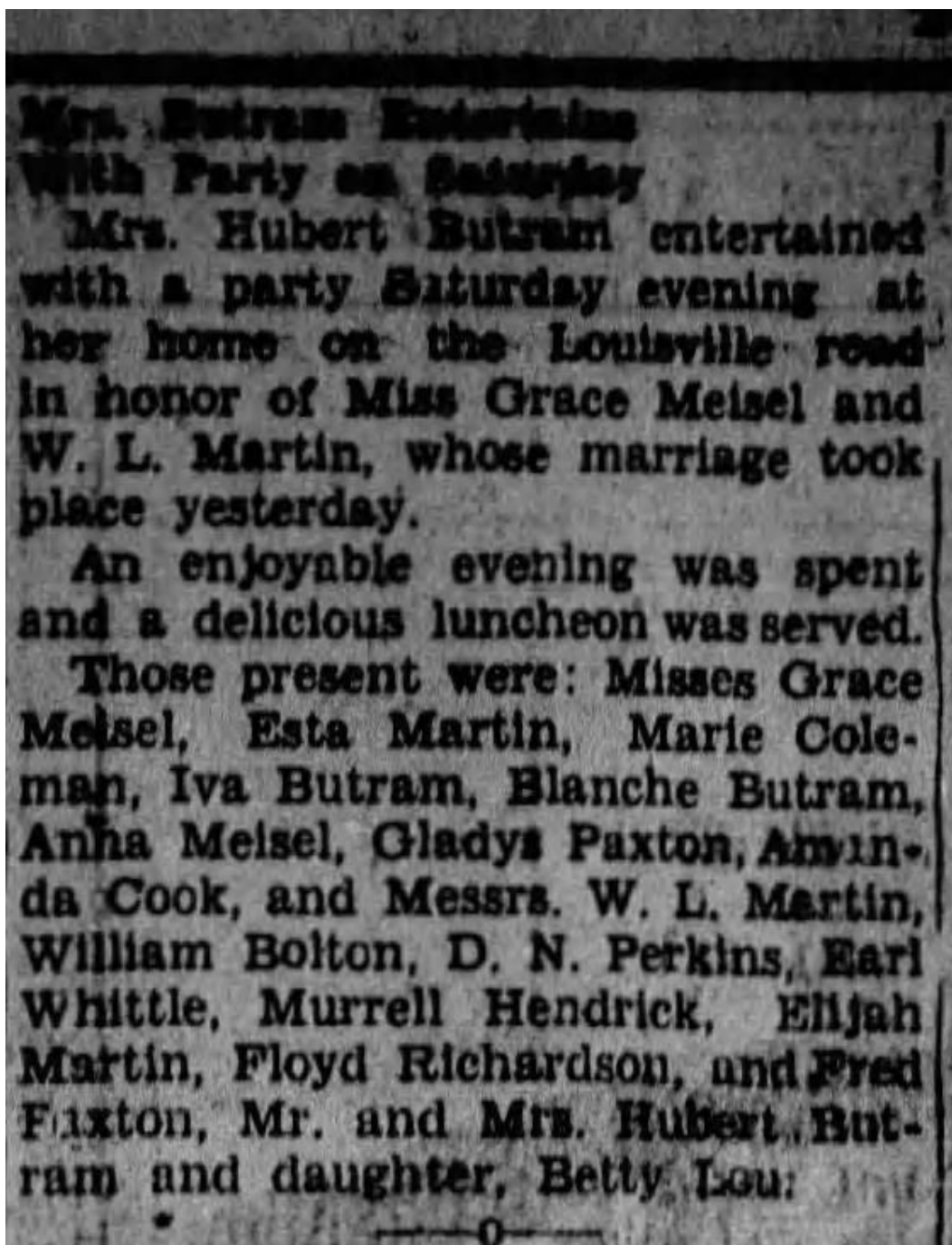

First Group Entered In "Ideal Family Contest"

The Ed Meisel family residing near Oakland was announced by Warren County Farm Agent R. C. Hopper Saturday as the first nomination for selection as the "Ideal Warren County Family" during the annual Warren County Fair here August 30-September 2.

The Warren county family will later compete with other groups from over the state in the selection of the "Ideal Kentucky Family" during the annual state fair in Louisville.

The winning family here will have expenses paid to the state fair. Families desiring to enter the contest should submit their qualifications to Mr. Hopper not later than August 25.

With each paid admission to the local fair, the purchaser will receive a vote to be cast in the "ideal family" selection.

Here are the qualifications for the Meisel family. The father is 50 years old, the mother, 48. They have four children, Mrs. W. L. Martin of Smiths Grove, formerly Miss Grace Meisel; Anna and Frances Meisel, both in their 20's, both teachers in the Oakland Baptist church Sunday school, and both holding school teaching positions for 1939-40 school year, and Charles Meisel, 17-year-old president of the Oakland 4-H club. Mr. Meisel is a member of the financial committee of the Oakland Baptist church.

The family resides on a 186-acre farm. The average income is about

Union Threatens Milk Shortage

Higher Prices Sought By Farmers In New York

UTICA, N. Y., Aug. 19—(AP)—Led by an ex-sailor, a farmer's union which three years ago had only eight members throttled the milk supply of 7,000,000 persons today with the latest strike in New York's turbulent \$2,000,000,000 dairy industry.

Grim pickets tightened blockades around upstate plants, further cutting the huge metropolitan market's dwindling supplies in their fight for higher prices. New York's doughty Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia called a Monday conference between rival factions.

Immediate acceptance to the conference bid came from the ex-sailor, Archie Wright, 47-year-old chairman of the dairy farmers union which called the milk strike in demanding a uniform base price increase to \$2.35 per hundredweight (47 quarts.) Dealers and leaders of rival farmer marketing factions also agreed to attend.

Wright's union, which now claims

\$500 from tobacco, about the same amount from milk and cream, between \$200 and \$300 from hogs, and between \$100 and \$150 from poultry.

4. Ages of children—boys should be about 18 years of age, girls 16 years of age and a youngster 9 or 10 years of age.
5. Community activity of parents.
6. Activity of children.
7. Religious activity of family.
8. Ambition of parents for children.

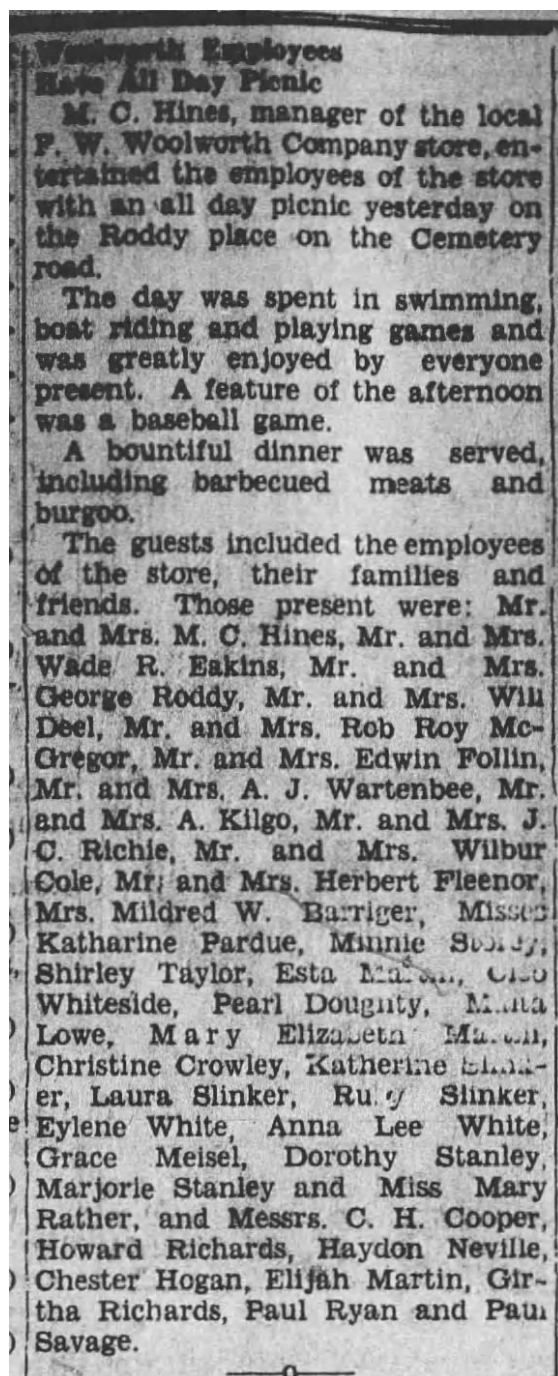

W. L. Martin, Smiths Grove Farmer, Dies

W. L. Martin, 65, a Smiths Grove farmer, was pronounced dead on arrival at City-County Hospital at 12:30 p.m. Sunday after suffering an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday at Hardy & Son Smiths Grove Chapel with burial in Smiths Grove Cemetery.

He was a member of the Oakland First Christian Church, where he was an elder, chairman of the board, secretary and treasurer.
